PUNCTUATION MARKS

FULL STOP

It is used for ending a sentence.

QUESTION MARK

It is used for asking questions.

Where are you going?

EXCLAMATION MARK

It is used for ending sentences, phrases and words which show some strong feeling or emotion.

What a beautiful day!

INVERTED COMMAS

It is used for showing a direct speech.

Gini said, "Don't step in the house!"

It is used for separating 3 or more items in a series.
