Q.5D Answer the following questions briefly.

Ans.: Helen, the ghost, has been helping the narrator with ghost stories because he was keen on writing them but lacked ideas. But she was going on strike, along with other ghosts because they were fed up with the way humans treated them. They were being summoned too often and they are

forced to leave their beds. They left haunting to answer questions on the Ouija board. Helen promises to help the narrator only if he gets his friends and acquaintances to stop using the Ouija board.

Q.5E Answer the following questions briefly.

How does the ghost undermine the narrator's faith in his ability to write ghost stories?

Ans.: The narrator had confidence in his ability to write a ghost story. In fact, he was able to give Jenkins a story whenever he asked for it. He felt that ghost stories specialized in him. But the ghost undermines his faith by telling him that she had often leaned on his shoulder to give him ideas and that he asked for her help quite often to write a ghost story.

Q.5F Answer the following questions briefly.

Ans.: John didn't want to cause any problems in his marriage and he thus wants the ghost to disappear before his wife appears. John's wife, Lavinia, is a jealous lady and John thinks that the sight of the ghost might affect her badly. Lavinia is also a joyful lady who loved to socialize and spend money.

Q.5G Answer the following questions briefly.

Why does the narrator hesitate to be a partner to Laura Hinkle during the Ouija Board Party?

Ans.: John hesitates to pair with Laura Hinkle during the Ouija Board party because he was scared about how Helen, the ghost would react to it. She had promised to help him write ghost stories only if he got his friends and acquaintances to stop using the Ouija Board.

Q.5H Answer the following questions briefly.

What message does the ghost convey to the group that had assembled in the narrator's house? What is their reaction to the message?

Ans.: Helen, the ghost gets furious about John playing the Ouija Board. He promised to get his friends and acquaintances to stop using it but he himself was doing so. She, therefore, interrupts the party by going to everyone's board and calling John a traitor. This makes everyone suspicious as they assume that John is cheating on Lavinia, but John manages to make Lavinia understand the situation.

Q.5I Answer the following questions briefly.

Do you agree with the narrator calling the assembly of women "manipulators?" Give reasons.

Ans.: Yes, the narrator was right in calling the assembly of women "manipulators". They manipulate the spirits to answer their questions through the Ouija Board. They also easily mistake the ghost's statement and suspect John of cheating on his wife.

Q.5J Answer the following questions briefly.

Why is John's wife angry? What does she decide to do?

Ans.: John's wife is angry as she believes that he is cheating on her. She, like other women at the Ouija Board Party, believe the ghost when she

calls him a traitor. She, therefore, decides to end her marriage and go to her grandmother's place.

Q.5K Answer the following questions briefly.

Why does John wish he were dead?

Ans.: John wishes he were dead because of the encounter with the ghost and the resulting situation created a mess and threatened to break his marriage. He didn't want to lose his wife over a false notion.

Q.5L Answer the following questions briefly.

When confronted by Lavinia about his flirtations over the Ouija Board, John insists that 'the affair was quite above-board, I assure you, my love'. Bring out the pun in John's statement.

Ans.: John assures Lavinia that there was nothing to worry about and that his affair with the ghost was quite above the Ouija Board. He also assures her that his encounter with the ghost was nothing at all and that he was loyal to her.
